On behalf of the members of the Middleton Police Department, I am pleased to present you with the Department's Annual Report for the year 2008.

2008 was another busy year for our Department. **Our calls for service increased slightly in 2008, up by 4% over 2007.** Early reports indicate a rise in crime across the country in 2008 that many are blaming on the downturn in our economy. That rise is, unfortunately, affecting our community as well. Fortunately, most of that increase was in property crimes and not in personal/violent crimes. Middleton continues to experience one of the lowest violent crime rates in the county. **Overall crime increased by 25% in 2008 from the 2007 rate.** The 2008 rate is similar to rates experienced in Middleton in 2002 through 2004. The largest percentage increase in crime (245%) was reported at our High School. Most crimes were related to thefts of IPODS and cell phones. Students are no longer prohibited from using these items in school during school hours and, along with the increased use of these items, thefts have increased. With the increase in the price of gas earlier in the year, we experienced a significant increase in thefts of gas. We also experienced an increase in commercial burglaries and the theft of building materials from building sites. Arrests have been made in many of the building material thefts and commercial burglary cases. We saw a significant drop in those cases in the latter part of 2008.

We continue to explore ways to help keep our children safe and worked with the School District to purchase **security equipment for the Kromrey Middle School and the High School** with grant money that was obtained as part of a COPS safe school grant.

We completed design work for the **new Police/Municipal Court** facility in 2008 and look forward to the construction of the facility in 2009 with a projected move in date of early 2010.

We will be undertaking a number of new initiatives in 2009 to help keep our community safe. We have applied for a **Community Oriented Policing Grant** that will help pay for training and materials to start a **GREAT program (Gang Resistance Education and Training)** in the 2009 – 2010 school year.

We have entered into a partnership with Quaker Steak and Lube that will pay for the lease of a **Police Motorcycle** and all necessary equipment. The motorcycle will become an integral part of our expanded **traffic enforcement efforts** in 2009. We will continue to participate in county-wide special enforcement programs aimed at reducing speeds and driving behaviors that often lead to traffic crashes.

We have started a **Volunteers in Policing Program**. This program will be used to train volunteers to assist us with major events including large community events and natural or other disasters.



Community Events

Downtown Gallery Night: On May 8, Middleton Police had a squad car on display and answered questions at this Chamber of Commerce event. Two lucky raffle winners won a ride to school with a friend in a police car.

Walgreen's Child ID: On June 3 and September 13, Middleton Police handed out child ID kits and McGruff interacted with the children.



Northlake Neighborhood Association Parade: On July 4, Middleton Police led the children in their annual bicycle parade from the Northlake neighborhood to Orchid Heights Park. Once at the park, they had a neighborhood cookout and games for the kids. A similar parade was led by Middleton Police in the Stonefield neighborhood. Community Programs


Citizens' Academy - From September 3 through November 5, Middleton Police held their 5th Annual Citizens' Academy. Twelve students comprised of various backgrounds completed classes in Defense and Arrest Tactics, Firearms, Investigations, Emergency Vehicles Operations Course and Traffic Law Enforcement and more. This year students also completed a community service project by doing fall yard work for a stroke victim. The Academy culminated with a graduation ceremony including a potluck dinner, awards and video.

Plan Reviews - The Community Awareness Officer reviews plans submitted to the City for new or expanding businesses and offers suggestions to make them safer.

Stop and Seat - The Dean Foundation and ATC generously donated several child/infant seats for officers to loan out on traffic stops instead of writing tickets for improperly secured children. To avoid a ticket, drivers then agree to rent very affordable child/infant car seats through Dean's "Every Ride a Safe Ride" program.



Crime Prevention Notices - Middleton Police officers continue to complete and issue notices to businesses and residences for crime risks they observe in the community.



SCAN - The Middleton Police Department continues to work with the Middleton Senior Center and the Safety and Crime Awareness Network.



Speed Watch - The Middleton Police Department has developed a new program in which volunteers will use hand held radar units to record vehicle speeds in residential areas. The license plates of speeding vehicles are recorded and warning letters are then mailed out by the Police Department.



Safe Assured ID - American Girl/Mattel has generously donated funds to purchase an identification system and kits which can be used for children, autistic “runners” and memory impaired adults. The kits digitally record and store images, audio and fingerprints on a mini-CD. All of the sensitive information on the disc is encrypted and there is no stored database anywhere else. The disc can be presented to any law enforcement agency in an emergency. Only law enforcement can access the encrypted information.



VIPS/Volunteers In Police Service - The Middleton Police Department is starting a VIPS program in which volunteers are matched based upon their skills and interests to jobs at the Police

Department. The list of possible jobs include: Good Neighbor Watch Coordinator, Citizens’ Academy Alumni Coordinator, Event Worker, Event Planner, Middleton Volunteer Partnership (MVP) Board Member, Investigative Services Bureau Assistant, Administrative Assistant and Futurist to name a few.



With Wings & a Halo “Back Packets”- Middleton Police officers distribute donated backpacks with books to children in crisis situations.



Middleton Business Watch - The MBW has seven board members from the business community and Police Department. The program has over 350 members and was started in 2004 to alert local businesses to crimes and to provide crime prevention training through bi-annual seminars. 2008 seminars were on Workplace Violence and Business Continuity.

Crime Prevention Surveys - The Middleton Police Department continues to provide crime prevention surveys to local business and homeowners with suggestions on how to improve their security.



Vacation Checks: Residents are encouraged to notify the Police while they are away on vacation, especially if it is for an extended period of time. It is valuable to know how to reach the homeowner and if anyone locally has keys in case a problem arises. Officers will periodically check the residence for problems.

Pedestrian Flag Crossings - The Middleton Police Department has partnered with Safe Communities to provide orange pedestrian flags at dangerous intersections.





2008 Traffic Safety Report

There were a total of 468 motor vehicle accidents in the City of Middleton in 2008 compared to 427 in 2007, for a 9.6% increase (41 more accidents). But when taking into account that of the 468 accidents, 105 were parking lot/private property accidents (compared to 84 in 2007) the actual increase in on-street accidents was 5.8%. There was a 25% increase in parking lot/private property accidents. It appears the severe snow falls of early 2008 also played a large part in the increase as from January 1 to March 31 there were 42 more accidents than the previous year, which accounts for the entire increase between the two years.

During 2008, directed traffic patrols on regular patrol shifts were performed for about 310 hours with 544 enforcement actions taken. Directed traffic patrols by officers on regular shifts are important as they target problem areas, areas of citizen concern and areas where a number of accidents occur. Citizen reports of areas of concern are forwarded to the Traffic Safety Coordinator who then informs the appropriate neighborhood officer so that attention can be directed to the problem.

Eight crossing guards were trained in 2008, two substitutes at Northside and six employees/parents at Sauk Trail who share the duties there. In 2009, the school zone areas of the elementary schools and middle school will use the 2008 Safe Route to School grant monies to help purchase permanently mounted speed radar displays for all four schools, which will further aid in calming traffic..

While at the Governor's Conference on Highway Safety, Sgt. Mueller found that the Middleton Police Department is well ahead of many state agencies in traffic safety for our officers in that the Department provides them with reflective vests and on-going driving training coupled with a restrictive pursuit policy and post accident review boards which analyze officer traffic accidents and make suggestions for improvement where appropriate. Many departments do not do all four of these actions.

Sgt. Mueller attended the national Lifesavers Conference in Portland, Oregon, with no cost to the Department as it was part of his 2007 Director's Award from the Wisconsin State Patrol and Wisconsin Department of Transportation. Many new and innovative programs were presented and discussed at the conference.

Once again the Department participated in the SMART program to target OWI offenders on the Hwy 12 corridor between Middleton and Cottage Grove. This was a highly publicized effort.

Sgt. Mueller participated in the Wisconsin Southern Railroad Operation Lifesaver effort where officers from various agencies road in the RR engine of a train traveling from the east side of Madison to Middleton's western limits. RR employees pointed out traffic safety concerns along the way and officers radioed to patrol officers when they observed crossing violations. Photos were taken and Sgt. Mueller is in the group photo that is part of the WSRR's 2009 calendar that is distributed throughout their coverage area.

The Department participated as a non-grant agency in the annual Click-It-Or-Ticket effort. Seventy-eight stops were made with 68 citations and 39 warnings issued.



Department staff provided input into the Middleton Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan 2009 which will be presented in 2009.

Officers participated in the Quaker Steak and Lube Bike Nights motorcycle safety presentation again this year. Part of the presentation was a display of motorcycle precision operations by members of the Madison Police Department and Dane County Sheriff's Department motorcycle patrols.

In 2009, the Middleton Police Department will also be able to show off the skill of precision motorcycle riding, thanks to Scott Acker of Quaker Steak and Lube who has signed a memorandum of understanding with the Middleton Police Department in which he agrees to help the Department purchase a fully equipped police Harley Davidson Electra Glide motorcycle, train two of the three officers who will be chosen to ride it and outfit all three with their safety gear. Quaker Steak and Lube and Scott Acker are to be commended for the dedication to traffic safety that has been part of the Bike Nights since their beginning here in Middleton.

A state grant was obtained for the Middleton Police Department that covers a full year that began in November 2008. The grant is for OWI patrols that can be performed wherever the need is felt, rather than only on HWY 12 where our grants in the past

have been limited to. The November and December results have been encouraging.

In 2009, Sgt. Mueller, as Traffic Safety Coordinator, will be attending the meetings of the Dane County Traffic Safety Committee, a statutorily mandated committee comprised of law enforcement, EMS, Fire, DOT, traffic engineers and school officials. The Dane County Traffic Safety Officers committee is merging with this committee. It has a more proactive approach as it analyzes all the fatal accidents in Dane County and makes recommendations as to what can be done to prevent them (roadway changes, signage, enforcement, etc).





Operations Division

MIPD Personnel

The authorized strength of sworn Middleton Police officers in 2008 was 34 officers. This breaks down to one Chief, two Lieutenants (one in charge of Administration, one in charge of Operations; which is uniformed patrol and investigations), six Sergeants, one in charge of the Investigative Services Bureau and five patrol Sergeants. The Investigative Services Bureau consists of the ISB Sergeant, four general assignment Investigators, two Police School Resource Officers and a Community Awareness Officer. Patrol has five

Sergeants, one on each shift and two swing Sergeants who are in command when the shift Sergeants are on their days off, in training or otherwise unavailable and 18 Officers to staff three shifts, 24 hours a day. Patrol minimum staffing is three officers on day shift, four officers on the afternoon shift and three officers on the night shift (with an increase of four officers on the weekends from 11PM to 3AM). This includes the patrol Sergeants.

2008 Operations Activity

In 2008, Middleton Officers responded to 19,127 calls for service; 8,155 were field initiated and 10,972 were dispatched (2007 figures: 18,458; 8,007 and 10,451). Officers issued 4,796 citations, 1,764 written warnings, made 389 arrests and investigated 469 traffic accidents (2007 figures: 5,431, 1,748, 338 and 427).

Significant Events in 2008

08-00207, 01/12/08, 4:12 AM, 1000 Block of North Gammon Road, Multiple Commercial Burglaries

Middleton Police Department received an alarm at Mystical Liquors at 4:12 AM. Upon arrival, they discovered that multiple businesses in the strip mall had their front windows or glass doors broken and items stolen. A person delivering newspapers provided a vehicle description. This was relayed to area law enforcement agencies. Madison police officers spotted the vehicle, attempted to stop it and got into a high speed chase. Two suspects were arrested at the time and had items stolen from the Middleton burglaries in their possession. Noel Brown, 28, of Madison, and Van Starks, 21, NPA, were arrested and charged with multiple counts of Burglary.

08-00411, 01/25/08, 5:00 AM, 3513 Roma Lane #8, Drug Search Warrant

Middleton Police detectives developed information that drugs were being sold from an apartment at 3513 Roma Lane. Furthermore, that the two male residents of the apartment had possession of several firearms. Based on this information, a search warrant was issued and Middleton Police requested the assistance of the Dane County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team. At 5:00 AM, members of the Emergency Response Team made a dynamic entry into the apartment, which included the use of distraction devices (flash bangs). The subjects were taken into custody without incident and the scene turned over to the Middleton Police. Drugs, paraphernalia and weapons were located in the apartment. Eighteen

year old Dakota Hefty was arrested and charged with Possession with Intent to Manufacture a Controlled Substance, Maintaining a Drug Dwelling and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Twenty year old Jacob Steiner was arrested and charged with Possession of THC, Maintaining a Drug Dwelling and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. A Drug Abatement letter was sent to the apartment complex management.

08-00444, 01/25/08, 7600 Terrace Avenue, Multiple Commercial Burglaries

Middleton Police investigated at least 12 commercial burglaries which occurred at the Middleton Centre, in the 7600 block of Terrace Avenue and the 7500 block of Hubbard Avenue. Multiple businesses were broken in and the offices ransacked. Cash and electronic items were taken and at least \$12,000.00 in damage occurred. Latent fingerprints were recovered by Evidence Technicians from a cash box handled by a suspect as well as glass in an entry way that was pushed in by a suspect. They were examined by the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory. A positive match was developed for 17 year old Spencer Hutchins of Madison. Hutchins was arrested by Detective Faga in January 2009 while he was meeting with his probation agent. Hutchins was taken to jail, charged with multiple counts of Burglary. A screwdriver was recovered in one of the offices broken into by the suspects (Middleton Times Tribune). DNA analysis revealed that it had been handled by 19 year old Tramaine Franklin. Franklin is currently incarcerated in the Wisconsin Prison System on unrelated charges and is being charged with multiple counts of Burglary.

08-00827, 02/15/08, 12:37 AM, 6300 Block of Pheasant Lane, Stabbing

Middleton Police received a 911 call of a person who was stabbed when he answered his door. Investigation revealed that 19 year old Ryan A. Schardt of Madison, stabbed the 17 year old victim due to a dispute over the purchase of alcohol. The victim received non-life threatening injuries and was released from the hospital. The suspect was taken into custody at his attorney's office where he surrendered to the police. He was charged with 1st Degree Reckless Injury.

08-01512, 03/16/08, 6300 Block of Maywood Avenue, Aggravated Assault

Police were notified of a fight between a boyfriend and girlfriend, where the male struck, strangled and threatened his girlfriend with a knife. The suspect fled as officers were approaching. He was located the following day, back in the victim's apartment, where they had reconciled. Twenty year old Scott Miller of Middleton was arrested and charged with Disorderly Conduct, Battery, False Imprisonment and 2nd Degree Reckless Endangerment.

08-02109, 04/11/08, 3:07 PM, 8301 University Avenue, State Bank of Cross Plains, Robbery

A suspect entered the bank, presented a note to the teller indicating he had a gun and that he wanted money. The suspect was given an undisclosed amount of cash and fled on foot behind the bank. The suspect was not arrested at the scene. The suspect was described as a male white, early 20's, medium height, thin, wearing a black knit hat with a brim, silver sunglasses, black long sleeve shirt and jeans. The suspect is believed to have robbed the AmCore Bank on Odana Road in Madison on March 19. The suspect is pictured below:



08-02108, 04/07/08, 9:52 PM, 1000 Block of N Gammon Road, Burglary

Middleton Police Department received an alarm at Mystical Liquors, located in the 1000 Block of N Gammon Road. Upon arrival, officers determined that both Mystical Liquors and Klinke Cleaners had been broken into. Officers viewed video surveillance footage from Mystical Liquors and observed the suspect breaking in to the store and stealing money. A description of the suspect was passed on to other patrol officers. An officer observed a suspect matching the description

walking on Gammon Road and made contact with him. Derek L. Richards, age 41, of Middleton, was arrested for burglary.

08-02721, 05/07/08, 2:36 PM, 6300 University Avenue, Bank Robbery

The State Bank of Cross Plains was robbed by a man who presented the teller with a note demanding money. This is the same suspect who robbed another branch of the State Bank of Cross Plains in Middleton in April as well as another bank in Madison in March.

08-02810 05/11/08, 12:13 PM, 1200 Block of Sweeney Drive, Robbery

A woman reported that her boyfriend jumped on her, threw her to the ground and then stole money from her. Eighteen year old Kelvin Sutton of Middleton was arrested and charged with Battery, Intimidation of a Victim and Robbery.

08-02850, 05/13/08, 4:41 AM, Lakeview Park, Arson Fire

Trash barrels were lit on fire which spread to the roof of the park shelter. Extensive damage occurred. Investigation revealed that this was an intentionally set fire. No suspects have been developed at this time.

08-03017, 05/17/08, 6700 Block of Century Avenue, Child Abuse

A 15 year old male held his 9 year old nephew's arm over a hot stove burner, severely burning the nephew's arm. The 15 year old was charged with Child Abuse.

08-03042, 05/19/08, Cold Stone Creamery, 1650 Deming Way, Burglary

Two employees of the business allowed a former employee of the business to hide in the store once they closed. The ex-employee, who knew the combination of the safe from his previous employment, opened the safe and stole \$800.00. Tiesha Bates, 17, of Madison, Tymiesha McGee, 18, of Madison and Eden Terrell, 18, NPA, were charged with Burglary.

08-03614, 06/13/08, 2:08 AM, 6300 Block of Maywood Avenue, Stabbing

Police received a 911 cellular call indicating a disturbance, but the caller hung up before an exact

address was established. Officers were sent to the GPS location indicated by the cell phone and located a large crowd in the parking lot of 6301 Maywood Avenue. It was determined that a man had been stabbed and he was given medical assistance by officers and eventually by Middleton paramedics. Twenty-three year old Courtney Ellington of Middleton was taken into custody in the parking lot, disarmed and arrested for 1st Degree Reckless Injury.

08-04338, 07/11/08, 10:39 PM, Underage Alcohol Party, 6900 Block of Apprentice Pl

Police responded to a reported underage drinking party on Apprentice Place. Officers observed a large number of young people inside who were drinking. Police received permission to enter the residence and cited 59 underage people for alcohol related offenses.

08-04400, 07/15/08, Burglary/Vehicle Thefts, Enterprise Rental, 3200 Block of Laura Lane

Officers investigated a burglary and auto theft at Enterprise Car Rental on Airport Road. A window to the business was broken and the suspect(s) entered the business and took the keys to two vehicles, a Ford Explorer and a Ford Edge. They then stole the vehicles off the lot. One vehicle was located abandoned in Madison. The second vehicle was stopped by the North Carolina Highway Patrol on 07/17/08 and three suspects were arrested. Due to latent fingerprint and DNA analysis on items from both stolen cars, and the arrest of the three suspects in North Carolina, 17 year old Deanjuante Champagne of Madison, 18 year old Trevone McClarn, NPA, and 18 year old Spence Hutchins of Madison (same suspect in the Middleton Center burglaries in January 2008) have been arrested and charged with Burglary and Auto Theft.

08-04987, 08/05/08, 11:42 AM, Bomb Threat, Middleton Ford, 7520 Century Avenue

A man drove into a service bay at Middleton Ford, took a duffel bag out of his car and announced there was a bomb in it. Police were notified and began evacuating the business while other officers approached the suspect. In speaking to the subject, it became clear that he was suffering from a mental illness. He was taken into protective custody and the bag was searched with negative results. The man was turned over to mental health professionals.

08-05175, 08/12/08, 7:59 PM, Animal Complaint, Middleton Dog Park, 5209 Hwy Q

The Middleton Police Department was notified of a dog attacking another dog in the Middleton Dog Park located off Hwy Q. The attacking dog was determined to be a Bull Mastiff, weighing approximately 135 pounds. He attacked a much smaller dog. The smaller dog was taken to an emergency vet clinic, but was eventually euthanized due to the severity of its injuries. Police located the owner of the Bull Mastiff and impounded the dog. The owner of the dog, Gary Lohrke, 56, of Middleton, was cited for a dangerous dog violation. Due to a long history of attacks against people and dogs, and the violation of a previous agreement in which Lohrke agreed to keep the dog leashed and muzzled while it was off his property, the Police Chief recommended that the dog be euthanized. The decision was appealed to the City Council, which voted to uphold the Chief's recommendation. The case was then appealed to Circuit Court. Initially, the Judge ordered the dog be euthanized, but an alternate plan was eventually proposed and agreed upon by the judge in which the dog was sent to a rescue group and Lohrke surrendered ownership.

08-05206, 08/14/08, 10:14 AM, Robbery, State Bank of Cross Plains, 6300 University Avenue

Middleton Police received a 911 call from the bank indicating it had just been robbed. The suspect presented a note indicating he had a gun and demanding money. The suspect fled the bank and area on foot and was not located. Detectives believe this is the same suspect responsible for two other bank robberies in Middleton, one in Madison and one in Monona. The State Bank of Cross Plains and the Wisconsin Bankers Association offered a \$10,000.00 reward for the arrest and conviction of the suspect. He is described as a male, white, early 20's, 5' 7", thin build, wearing a dark knit hat with a brim and sunglasses. The suspect is pictured below:



08-05325, 08/19/08, 2:30 AM, Burglary, Fitzgerald's Restaurant, 3112 Parmenter Street

Employees opening the restaurant noticed that the drive up window had been smashed out and the business was broken into and money taken. The M.O. of the burglary indicated that the suspect was familiar with the business. Evidence was collected, including video and blood (the suspect cut himself while climbing through the broken window). A former employee was identified as a possible suspect, interviewed and DNA samples obtained. Under questioning, after being confronted with the video evidence and the threat of DNA analysis, 25 year old Jason Storlie of Madison admitted his involvement in the break-in. He was charged with Burglary.

08-05480, 08/25/08, 6:23 PM, Assault/Battery, 1200 Block of Sweeney Drive

Victim reported that her ex-boyfriend kicked down the door to gain entry to her apartment, physically assaulted her, threatened her with a knife and took her cell phone and car keys. He fled the scene prior to police arrival. The suspect was located the following day. Forty-eight year old Scott Blunk of Middleton was charged with 1st Degree Reckless Endangerment, False Imprisonment, Disorderly Conduct, Theft and Criminal Damage to Property.

08-05678, 09/03/08, 1:51 AM, 2051 Allen Boulevard Burglaries

A resident reported that someone broke into his occupied apartment through the sliding glass patio door in the middle of the night. Responding officers located 29 year old Anthony L. Hayes of Madison. Hayes was taken into custody. Additional investigation revealed that three apartments had been entered and numerous stolen items were recovered. Hayes was jailed on a probation violation and Detectives are awaiting forensic lab results for additional charges.

08-05716, 09/04/08, 6300 Block of Pheasant Lane, Abduction

The Middleton Police Department was notified that a 16 year old woman was abducted, forced into a vehicle and that the woman's father had received a ransom demand. The Middleton Police Department sought assistance from the Wisconsin Department of Criminal Investigation and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Further investigation revealed that

the woman knew the man she left with and that she had left with him voluntarily. The woman was initially traced to Chicago, then California. The woman is now with her mother and the man in California. It has been determined that no crime occurred.

08-06399, 10/03/08, 12:09AM, Theft, Bennett's Sinclair, 3415 Parmenter Street

On October 3, 2008, a local resident, who was aware of the theft problems in the area, contacted the Middleton Police Dispatch Center to report a suspicious person in the area of Bennett's Sinclair gas station. Middleton Police Officer Formby was the first to arrive on scene at approximately 12:10 AM. Officer Formby approached the area on foot and was able catch the suspect "red handed" as he was taking junk metal automobile parts from the Sinclair station. Middleton resident, Adam Leonard, 30 years of age, was arrested on charges of Theft and Bail Jumping. At the time of this incident, Leonard was out on bail as he had been arrested, but not yet adjudicated, for similar crimes by other Burglary Task Force member agencies. Utilizing evidence gathered during this arrest, Middleton Police Detective Faga was able to draft and execute a search warrant of Leonard's apartment. This subsequent investigation resulted in the charging of Leonard with the burglaries of the Middleton CVS Pharmacy, the Middleton PDQ office building and one Madison burglary.

08-06607, 10/11/08, Reckless Endangerment, Middleton High School, 2100 Bristol Street

Middleton officers assigned to work the Homecoming dance were alerted to a reckless driver in the parking lot. Officers located the vehicle, which was occupied and running, but stopped. As officers approached the vehicle in a well lit area, they shone their flashlights on the vehicle, illuminating the interior. The operator of the vehicle accelerated and struck one officer, who went up onto the hood of the car. The operator stopped after hitting the officer and was arrested. The officer received minor injuries and was able to continue working. The driver of the vehicle, 19 year old Madison resident, Lucio Ocotl Garcia, was an ex-student and was driving recklessly to impress a girl at the dance. He was intoxicated and drug impaired. He was arrested for 2nd Degree Recklessly Endangering Safety and OWI related

charges are anticipated, pending return of a blood test. The 18 year old passenger, Angel Hernandez Acosta, of Middleton, was arrested for Underage Drinking and Open Intoxicants in a Vehicle.

08-07185, 11/04/08, 3:05 PM, Bomb Threat, Middleton High School

On Presidential Election day, a bomb threat was phoned in to the Middleton High School, which was also being used as an election polling place. Due to specificity in the call and the fact that the school was an open environment because of the election, the decision was made to evacuate the school and move the poll to the Middleton Fire Station. Using information from students, computer records and video surveillance, a 16 year old student was arrested within hours of the call. The student was charged with Making a Bomb Threat as well as Interfering with a Presidential Election.

08-07217, 11/14/08, 5:30 AM, High Risk Search Warrant, 6600 Block of Century Avenue

Middleton detectives developed information of a drug dwelling and wanted persons at a duplex in the 6600 block of Century Avenue. Because of the nature of the information and previous violent history of the occupants, the Dane County Tactical Response Team was activated to make entry. The dynamic entry was successfully carried out with no one being injured. Middleton detectives and officers then performed the search warrant. Alberto Reyes, 23, of Middleton, was arrested on a warrant alleging repeated sexual assault of a child, which had occurred earlier in the year. The drug investigation continues. A drug abatement letter was sent to the landlord.

08-07512, 11/18/08, 10:03 AM, Assist Other Department, 8511 Greenway Boulevard

Madison Police Detectives contacted the Middleton Police Department in reference to an on-going suicide/homicide investigation being conducted by that department. The Dane County 911 Communications Center received a cellular telephone call at approximately 9:11 AM. The male caller informed the dispatch center that police should be sent to the intersection of Tree Lane and High Point Road in the City of Madison as there was a dead individual in a motor vehicle at that location. The caller then hung up on the dispatcher before providing any other additional information.

Madison officers responded to the scene and located one adult male subject and a juvenile male subject both in a vehicle at that location. Both individuals had a gunshot wound. The vehicle in question was a black Jeep registered to Ryan T. Dutter and Christine A. Gabron of Middleton. Madison Detectives requested that Middleton Detectives respond to the Dutter address to check the welfare of Gabron. Madison Detectives indicated that they were concerned that there may be another victim either injured or deceased at this address. Middleton Detectives assisted Madison Detectives in contacting the resident at this address, securing the apartment, conducting interviews, conducting a residential search and completing the follow-up investigation of this incident. This investigation revealed that the distraught father of a 12 year old autistic son took his son's life before committing his own suicide.

08-07571, 11/20/08, 3:58 PM, Death Investigation, 5160 Brindisi Court

Middleton Police officers were dispatched to an apartment for a 25 year old male subject, later identified as Jason Swanson, who was pulseless and not breathing. Middleton Police Officers and Middleton Paramedics were unable to revive Swanson. It was later determined by the Dane County Coroner's Office that Swanson died as the result of a Heroin overdose. Middleton Police Detectives are currently conducting an on-going investigation into who provided Swanson with the Opiates that lead to his death.

08-07813, 12/01/08, 3:41 AM, 6300 Block of Maywood Avenue, Reckless Endangerment

A man and woman were awakened in the middle of the night by the woman's ex-boyfriend standing over their bed. The ex-boyfriend attempted to stab the current boyfriend in the chest, then struck the woman in the mouth. He was arrested by Middleton officers as he fled the scene in his vehicle. Thirty-six year old Miguel Aragon was jailed, charged with: Stalking Resulting in Bodily Harm, Armed Burglary, two counts of 2nd Degree Reckless Endangerment, two counts of Battery and Theft.

08-08029, 12/10/08, 11:29 AM, 8400 Block of Greenway, Motor Vehicle Theft

A City Department of Public Works employee was shoveling snow and left his city pickup truck, with attached trailer, running in the parking lot. The vehicle and trailer were stolen, last seen entering the eastbound Beltline Highway, with the ramp to the trailer scraping on the ground. The vehicle was located abandoned behind the Copps Food store on Junction Road, in the City of Madison, and the trailer was located nearby, behind the Target Store. A short time later, an elderly couple who had left their vehicle running in the Target parking lot, reported that their vehicle had been stolen. Twenty-four year old Oran Woodfin, of Madison, was subsequently arrested and interviewed by Middleton and Madison detectives. He admitted stealing the Middleton Department of Public Works pickup truck. He said he drove it behind Target and took the trailer off. He said as he was driving away, he heard a Middleton police officer talking to him on the Middleton Department of Public Works radio (a Middleton officer switched to the Department of Public Works radio frequency and told him to bring the stolen truck back). He said he abandoned the truck, then found the other running vehicle in the front of the shopping center, so he decided to steal it. Woodfin was jailed on numerous charges by Middleton and Madison authorities.

06-04064, 07/23/06, 8:04 PM, 3400 Block of Marino Court, Attempted Homicide

In July of 2006, Middleton Police investigated a case where members of two rival Hispanic gangs got into a confrontation which culminated in a suspect firing two shots from a handgun, one of which struck the victim in the knee. A long investigation by Middleton Detectives, aided by agents from the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Agency, led to charges being filed in the case. Victor Cervantes, of Texas, was charged with Attempted First Degree Homicide and First Degree Reckless Endangerment. Pablo Elizando and Jose Marquez, of Madison, were charged with Attempted First Degree Homicide. Miguel Miranda-Lopez was charged with First Degree Reckless Endangerment. All subjects were taken into custody this fall and await trial with the exception of Cervantes who is believed to have fled to Mexico.

07-08582, 12/31/07, Security Fraud

A Middleton Detective worked closely with the Wisconsin Department of Financial Institutions and US Postal Inspectors in what turned out to be a

\$600,000.00 fraud case with multiple victims. The suspect, Russell Badder, of Oshkosh, was recently charged in Federal Court.

Bank Robber Nabbed

On 09/16/08, the bank robber who had robbed Middleton banks three times as well as a bank in Monona and one in Madison, robbed the Anchor Bank in Madison near West Towne Mall. An alert customer in the drive-up lane realized a robbery was occurring, notified 911 and directed the police

to the suspect who was arrested without incident. He confessed to committing all the bank robberies to Middleton and Madison Detectives. The suspect is John B. Kowal of Madison. The alert customer was awarded the \$10,000.00 reward money for his quick action and assistance.



Increase in Gas Thefts Results in Policy Change in June

The Police Department observed a 340% increase in gas drive-offs/thefts in the first half of 2008. The high cost of gasoline no doubt was responsible for this phenomenon. The Department not only saw an increase in the number of incidents, but also in the monetary amount of each theft. What used to be a \$20.00 or \$30.00 crime became a \$60.00 to \$100.00 crime. Solving these crimes can be difficult. Suspects were stealing license plates for the sole purpose of filling up with gas and driving away, surveillance cameras seldom capture the license plate and clerks are often distracted or unable to read the plate numbers.

The Department worked proactively, with limited success in some cases, with the owners of convenience stores and gas stations to encourage

them to institute pre-pay methods at the pumps. This is an entirely preventable crime, the Department was spending an inordinate amount of energy in investigating (usually unsuccessfully) these crimes and the businesses were losing more and more money. In June, notice was sent to area convenience stores and gas stations that the Middleton Police Department would no longer respond to gas drive off complaints.

It is difficult to measure the effectiveness of the policy since the price of gas declined as dramatically in the second half of the year as it rose in the first half, but most if not all gas dispensing businesses have instituted pre-pay, thereby reducing or eliminating the ability to steal gas.

Middleton's Big Event

Middleton's Big Event was held on June 14. The event was a community wide affair, culminating in a concert by the Bo Deans and fireworks in an empty field across Airport Road from the Middleton Airport. The Police Department switched the patrol force to 12 hour shifts and manned the concert event with 16 officers, two dispatchers and two mounted patrol (horse) officers from the Capitol Police Department. We used the Dane County Command Vehicle 1 for our Command

Post. This mobile command post was provided to Dane County by Homeland Security funds and is available for use by any Dane County Emergency Service for major events. The command post has state of the art communication facilities, phones, computers and cameras.

Other than the weather, the event was uneventful, from the police perspective.

Alcohol Compliance Checks

In December and January, the Middleton Police Department conducted another round of alcohol compliance checks. The purpose of this effort was to determine the degree to which licensed establishments complied with laws relating to the sale of alcoholic beverages to underage persons. In July of 2007, the compliance rate was 33%, and in December of 2007, 85%. The current round of 34 checks yielded a compliance rate of 47%.

On December 1, 2008, all licensed establishments in the City of Middleton were notified in advance by letter that compliance checks would be done. Two citizen volunteers, one 19 and the other 20 years old, were used. No attempts were made to misrepresent the volunteers' age or to distract the business employee. If requested, the volunteers provided their actual WI photo driver's license which clearly indicated that they were not of legal drinking age. The WI driver's license was printed

vertically, indicating they were under the legal drinking age at the time of issuance, and also had the date that they would be 21 years old clearly printed on the front. If questioned by a business employee, the volunteers verbally provide their actual age. The volunteers worked under the supervision of police officers and were under continuous observation.

Eighteen persons were cited for selling alcoholic beverages to an underage person, which could result in a \$361.00 fine. They may also face sanctions from their employers. The City's alcohol licensing committee will review the compliance check results.

Additional compliance checks will be conducted in 2009.




Neighborhood Districts

NEIGHBORHOOD OFFICER PROGRAM

We have broken the city down into 24 “neighborhoods”. Uniformed patrol officers are assigned to specific neighborhoods as primary or secondary officers. Even though they do not work or patrol in their neighborhood every day, the officers are responsible for learning of the problems affecting their neighborhoods as well as the people, groups, departments or organizations that can help them solve issues in their neighborhood. Police are seldom the only organization that can solve problems, but we can certainly facilitate problem solving by identifying problems and getting the appropriate agency to help.

Middleton officers have had many successes this year working with the stakeholders in their neighborhoods, other city departments and community groups.





2008 Training

The training program is broken down into two different components: in-service training and specialized training. State standards mandate that

every Police Officer in Wisconsin receive 24 hours of training. Middleton officers traditionally receive in excess of this amount of in-service training alone.

2008 In-service Training

For the last several years, Middleton, Sun Prairie and Fitchburg Police Departments have collaborated on a number of projects, including in-service training. The consortium of three Departments trains over 130 officers. In 2008, the training consortium put on 17 classes in four quarters. Firearms training was provided in each quarter, one quarter at the Madison Area Technical College indoor shooting range (This range is very useful in the cold winter weather as well as being able to practice in low light conditions. Of particular concern is that MATC will be razing the building housing the indoor range and there are no

plans to construct a replacement in the near future. That means there will be no indoor firing range in Dane County, the closest one will be in Janesville.) and three quarters at the Dane County Law Enforcement Training Center. Firearms training consists of pistol and rifle (AR 15) qualification.

Other topics covered during in-service training included: Defense and Arrest Tactics; Less Lethal and Electronic Control Device (Taser) recertification; OWI traffic legal update; emergency vehicle operation; vehicle contacts and rapid response to an active shooter.

2008 Specialized Training

In 2008, Middleton officers attended 289 specialized training classes totaling almost 5000 hours. A training goal was to send each officer to at least one specialized training class. Some of the classes officers attended were: Lifesaver 2008 Conference in Portland, Oregon (Sgt. Mueller was sent to this class at no expense due to his winning the Wisconsin Traffic Officer of the Year Award in 2007); Governor's Conference on Highway Safety; ATAC Crime Analysis; Street Cop Spanish; Composite Drawing for Law Enforcement; Autism and Law Enforcement; National Association of Field Trainers Conference; Investigating Alcohol Facilitated Sexual Assaults; numerous Crime Prevention courses; Field Training Officer Certification; Suicide Prevention; Evidence

Technician School and Criminal Street Gang Identification.

Members of the Command Staff received specialized training also. Two new supervisors were appointed in 2008, Sgt. Darrin Zimmerman and Communication Supervisor Wendy McKnight. Both were sent to a two week course on Supervision of Police Personnel by Northwestern University. Sgt. Britt took over the Investigative Services Bureau and attended a two week course on Management of the Detective Bureau, also put on by Northwestern University. Other management training included FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development; FBI National Academy Conference; Boomers and Gen X'ers; Attorney General's

Summit on Public Safety; Integrity Leadership and the Racial Justice Summit. Chief Keil attended the International Association of Chiefs of Police Conference in San Diego in November.

One goal of the Training Team is to send members of the Command Staff to a law enforcement management “long school”. To date, Chief Keil

and Lt. Foulke have graduated from the FBI National Academy in Quantico, VA; Lt. Kakuske has graduated from the Northwestern University School of Staff and Command held in Milwaukee and Sgt. Barry Reynolds has graduated from the Wisconsin Executive Development Institute in Appleton.

Police Management Training

Sgt. Troy Hellenbrand

On November 14, 2008, Sergeant Troy Hellenbrand graduated from Northwestern University’s 270th Class of Police Staff and Command. The ten week school was held in Janesville, WI. The class consisted of 30 students from 26 departments from south central Wisconsin. The School of Police Staff and Command is an intensive ten-week program that prepares law enforcement managers for senior positions by uniquely combining academic principles with practical applications. Sergeant Hellenbrand’s staff study research paper was on the feasibility of setting up a traffic enforcement team for Middleton Police.

Graduation ceremonies were held at the Janesville Holiday Inn Conference Center and included a luncheon and key note address by Madison Police Department Chief Noble Wray. Attending the

ceremony from the Middleton Police Department were Chief Keil and Lieutenants Kakuske and Foulke.

Troy returned to work as the 2nd detail shift commander.



Investigative Services Bureau Report

The authorized strength of the Middleton Police Investigative Services Bureau (ISB) is a detective sergeant, four detectives, two Police School Resource Officers (SRO) and a Community Awareness Officer (CAO). The four detectives are: Craig Faga, Patty Faust, David Haselow and Daniel Jones. The two Police School Resource Officers are Jeremy Geiszler at the Middleton High School, and Jill Tutaj at Kromrey Middleton School. The Community Awareness Officer is David Kasdorf. The unit is supervised by Detective Sergeant Steven Britt.

The month of July brought significant changes to the Investigative Services Bureau (ISB). Three of the four detectives now serve on a long term basis with their indefinite appointment to ISB being contingent upon personal job satisfaction and an on-going evaluation of their individual job performance. The fourth detective serves on a fifteen month rotating position. The two school resource officers and the community awareness officer each serve on a staggered three year rotation. The community awareness officer serves in a three year rotating capacity.

The objectives for the planned movement of personnel from the Patrol Unit into the ISB, and

back again to Patrol, are to support the cross training of personnel in all aspects of department operations, to provide a fresh perspective and to provide opportunities for career growth for newer members of the department. These objectives are constantly being evaluated and balanced against the Department's need for experienced investigators in key positions.

On July 14th, 2008, Sergeant Steven J. Britt assumed command of the Middleton Police Department's Investigative Services Bureau (ISB). The lateral assignment to serve as the ISB supervisor will be a three year commitment.

Along with conducting and supervising all criminal investigations, the detective sergeant reviews all crime reports and by using an investigative model, makes the determination if the case has solvability factors or is of significant public seriousness to merit assignment to an investigator. Atop the traditional criminal investigations conducted, the ISB unit is responsible for investigating worthless check complaints, all death investigations; coordinate the department's proactive programs, such as the Citizen's Academy, and conducting background investigations for prospective new employees.

Police School Resource Officers

Middleton High School

In 2008, Middleton High School remained one of the busiest locations in the city. For the calendar year, there were 517 calls for service and 349 incident reports completed. With nearly 2000 students and several hundred more teachers and support staff in two separate buildings, this is really no surprise.

The school population is as big as some small cities, and as with any other city of this size, problems will occur.

Overall, the transition for the new students has been relatively smooth. There have been a few bumps in

the road, but thankfully they have been minimal. This year it was not only the students who had to experience a transition, but the staff as well. After fulfilling his three year commitment as the high school resource officer, Officer Jerry Raffel returned to the uniform patrol division and Officer Jeremy Geiszler took over the position of Police School Resource assignment.

The biggest problem that faced the students coming into school this fall was theft. The 2008-2009 school year came with some substantial changes in school policies. They have decided to allow students to bring in iPods and cellular phones to be used during appropriate times in the school day. An overwhelming majority of students have at least one of these items, if not both. Combine the availability

of these items with the fact that a large number of students do not lock up their valuables and you have a crime of opportunity waiting to happen. Since the beginning of the school year, Officer Geiszler has been working on educating the students on the need to lock up their belongings, and also with the school's administrative team to come up with innovative solutions to this problem.

The work at the school is always challenging, but at the same time it is very rewarding. Working hand in hand with the students and staff is a great example of this department's community oriented policing philosophy at work.

Kromrey Middle School

2008 was a busy year for the Kromrey Police School Resource Officer (SRO). Halfway through the year, this position was made full time. The position includes Kromrey Middle School and the three elementary schools in the City of Middleton.

During January and February, with call time permitting, the SRO traditionally spends a great deal of time with the kindergarten. This time is committed to the younger students as it has usually been a couple of months since they have had interaction with the SRO and this is a way to regain the connection.

In the spring, the SRO begins the review session of Keeping Safe. This is a protective behavior class which is team taught with the school social worker. The review is given to kindergartners through fourth grade. Also while doing this, the SRO covers summer safety tips such as bike and pool safety.

In September, school started again and was very busy. The big event in the fall at Kromrey is the Fun Run. This is where all students train to run a three mile course at the beginning of September. The SRO helps out with this event by making sure the

course is safe and is there on the day of the event if needed.

In the fall, the SRO also does internet safety for all fifth and sixth grade classes. This is a program that was received from Net Smartz. It is an interactive internet safety program which teaches students methods of being safe on the internet. The main event in the fall is the Keeping Safe program. The SRO goes into every class in all three elementary schools, kindergarten through fourth grade, and teaches the Keeping Safe program. In total, the SRO goes into 62 elementary classes two times each in the fall. This is a great way of getting to know the students at the beginning of the year and to teach protective behaviors for the year to come. Also during the fall, the SRO goes into 5th and 6th grade classes and talks to the children about Halloween safety tips. These are the ages when kids go alone without their parents for the first time and it is important for them to have safety rules.

On a daily basis at Kromrey, the SRO helps supervise the Kromrey Middle School students in the morning before school, at lunchtime and handles all calls for service inside of the school.

During 2008, the drop off area for students in the morning before school was causing several problems. For years, this has been an ongoing issue. It is believed that this has been taken care of with several cones and signage that was ordered marking areas where students should be dropped off.

In 2008, Kromrey reached an all-time high for enrollment reaching over 700 students. It is obvious that the students are outgrowing the school. The hallways are very crowded during passing time which has lead to students bumping into each other and causing some minor disturbances. This is a significant issue at Kromrey that will hopefully be resolved in the near future.




Communications, Records & Court Activity

In 2008, long time dispatcher Wendy McKnight was promoted to Communications Center Supervisor, a newly established position. McKnight has since completed Northwestern's First Line Supervisor Course.

An additional dispatcher position was created to bring the number of full-time dispatchers to six. The position was filled by Keith Cleasby, who has extensive 9-1-1 Dispatcher experience. The new position allows the staffing of two dispatchers during some peak activity periods.

Dispatchers previously certified in Emergency Police Dispatch (EPD) renewed their certifications. Integration of the EPD software with Global Computer Aided Dispatch was achieved, but migration to the Communications Center Primary Dispatch Console has yet to be achieved. IT continues to work on it.



The Department implemented a policy of dispatching all 9-1-1 calls to field units for disposition, including calls that are mistakes, playing, interrupted, hang-ups, disconnects, etc.

In 2008, the Communications Center handled 26,737 officer responses to 19,190 Calls for Service (CFS), consuming over a half a million minutes of officer time (excluding documentation, reporting and processing time). The average CFS takes 26.61 minutes of officer time. The number of officers required per citizen CFS varies by time of day – Day Shift 1.28, Evening Shift 1.38, Night Shift 1.65. Calls for Service (CFS) initiated by officers were up 2%. CFS initiated by

citizens were up 5%, while CFS initiated via 9-1-1 were up 19% in 2008 and up 56% since 2006. CFS from all sources were up 4% in 2008.

In 2008, the Records Bureau processed 8,454 new incident reports (incidents may have multiple supplemental reports). On an average day, there are 126 reports and 243 minutes of dictation pending processing. During peak activity periods, the work load rose to as much as 198 reports and 588 minutes of dictation pending. In 2008, moving forward the Records Bureau began scanning all documents related to incidents, and no longer retains the paper, unless it has some intrinsic evidentiary value. Plans to scan tens of thousands of previously retained police records before a possible move to a new police building have thus far been stymied. The configuration of the City's application does not permit a specific record to be retrieved through query if the input was done in bulk. For example, finding one ticket out of 10,000 scanned. IT continues to work on it. Records are generally required to be retained for a minimum of seven years.

Records Bureau personnel took on new duties processing payments during Municipal Court Arraignment Nights. This freed the Municipal Court Clerk to perform court room processing during arraignments, a task previously performed by police personnel.

Lynn Endres, the Department's Civilian Court Officer, was named Evidence Room Manager and completed Evidence Room management training, thereby freeing a sworn detective from this task. This is a pivotal role given the planning taking place for the evidence room in the new police building and the critical need to free space in the current evidence system by purging items no longer required as evidence. To improve efficiency and facilitate the move of over 6,000 items of evidence (while maintaining the chain of custody), in 2008 the Department procured barcode scanning equipment and technology. IT continues to work on system configuration.

Retirements

On January 1, 2008, Sergeant Dave Kromm retired from the Middleton Police Department after 23 years of service. Sgt. Kromm joined the Department on November 2, 1984 as a part time Dispatcher. He became a Middleton Police Officer on September 9, 1985 and was promoted to Sergeant on December 15, 1990. Sgt. Kromm was a certified trainer in numerous law enforcement areas, was the lead trainer for the Middleton Police Training Team and worked for the MATC Police Academy for over 20 years, training new officers attending the police academy.


Communication Center Supervisor Wendy McKnight:


Officer Jeremy Geiszler:

warnings he issued compared to other officers. While Middleton officers are encouraged to be well rounded in their policing activities, Mike's dedication to traffic safety is to be commended.

Dispatcher Sue Buechner:

Sue has been a Middleton police dispatcher since March 8, 2005. Sue's skills were put to the test on July 4, 2007, at 10:36 PM. Middleton police dispatch center received a cellular 911 call from the passenger of a vehicle which had plunged at least 75 feet over a ledge at a nearby quarry. The caller reported several people were trapped in the vehicle and were seriously injured. Dispatcher Buechner was able to use GPS technology to determine where the accident occurred, calmed and reassured the caller, and extracted information from the caller so that police, firefighters and paramedics could find the exact location of the accident. Although one person died in the accident, Dispatcher Buechner's actions were critical in getting aid to the other injured passengers.



Middleton Police Training Team - Sgts Troy Hellenbrand, Steve Britt and Darrin Zimmerman, Detective Craig Faga, Officers Greg Dixon, David Kasdorf, Rich O'Connor, Jeremy Geiszler and retired Sgt Dave Kromm:

State law mandates that every police officer in Wisconsin receive 24 hours of training a year (although most Middleton officers receive in excess of the minimum). Core areas of training are firearms, defense and arrest tactics, vehicle contacts and emergency vehicle operation. The above named officers have received extensive training on instructing officers in these areas, typically

conducted during in-service sessions every quarter. Several years ago, Middleton police combined efforts with Sun Prairie and Fitchburg police departments to provide in-service training for their officers. The Middleton training team has consistently led the way in providing innovative, evolving and timely training to the officers. These training officers work long hours, often in



unpleasant conditions with no benefits other than the self-satisfaction they receive for their role in working with well trained officers and the knowledge that they are keeping the officers and the community they serve safe.

Middleton Fire Department:

The Middleton Fire Department fills many roles, traditional and a bit non-traditional, which are very helpful to the Police Department. On three occasions this year, the Police Department has requested assistance from the Fire Department in locating missing people.

These cases included a suicidal woman believed to be in the Nature Preserve, a man visiting relatives from out of town who left the residence in inclement weather without the proper clothing on

and an elderly woman suffering dementia who also left in inclement weather without warm clothes. In each case, the Fire Department responded with a full turnout and began a grid search, on foot and ATV, using computers with GPS technology to map areas that had been covered and those where searches needed to be completed.

In each case, the missing person was located. The Police Department wishes to recognize the efforts of the Fire Department in this area and other areas of mutual concern.



Life Saving Awards

Dispatcher Tim Hoeksema, Officers Travis Kakuske, Rick Wipperfurth and Matt Sherry: On May 2, 2007, at 3:29:22 AM, Dispatcher Hoeksema received a 911 call in reference to a 69 year old male with no pulse and not breathing at a residence in the 6400 block of Elmwood Avenue. He immediately activated the alert tones. He was clear and concise with the information and dispatched the officers immediately allowing an extremely fast response time.

Officer Wipperfurth was first on scene and verified PNB status. Officers Kakuske and Sherry arrived to assist Officer Wipperfurth with administrating

CPR and one AED shock prior to paramedics arrival. The patient was transported to the UW Hospital and recovered from his medical condition.



Attorney General Award

The Middleton Police Department received an award from Wisconsin Attorney General JB Van Hollen as part of the annual ceremony commemorating Wisconsin's Missing Children and Adults. The ceremony, held on June 20 at the State Capitol, was produced by the Department of Justice's Clearinghouse for Missing and Exploited Children and Adults to commemorate Wisconsin's 904 missing children and 258 missing adults.

The Middleton Police Department received the AMBER Alert Law Enforcement Award from Attorney General Van Hollen as a result of a missing children and AMBER Alert investigation in 2007. The award was presented for outstanding public service in helping to protect and save the lives of children and adults.

Along with Attorney General Van Hollen, Middleton Police Sgt. Barry Reynolds spoke at the ceremony, delivering a message of hope to the

families of missing persons. Sgt. Reynolds was requested to speak at the ceremony by the Wisconsin Department of Justice because of his involvement in the training of state law enforcement officers in missing children investigations, and as an advocate for missing children and their families.



Bank Robbery Suspect Arrested

On June 18, 2008, Jarrett M. James, 28, of Madison, was found guilty in Federal Court (Western District of Wisconsin) of two bank robberies occurring in Middleton after a three day jury trial. The case was prosecuted by Assistant US Attorney John Vaudreuil. Both robberies occurred at Bank Mutual on Century Avenue. The first robbery occurred on 03/16/06, the suspect pointed a gun at the tellers and obtained \$62,000.00. The second robbery occurred on 03/14/06, the same suspect again threatened the tellers with a gun and obtained \$59,000.00.

On July 17, 2008, a ceremony was held at the FBI Madison Office, recognizing the successful work by the police, FBI and Federal Prosecutor.

Physical Fitness Test

In 2007, the Middleton Police Department instituted a pass/fail physical fitness standard for new recruits. The test consists of a 1.5 mile run within 15 minutes and 54 seconds, 300 meter run within 68 seconds, upper body strength test of bench press of .68x his/her total body weight one time or 25 push ups, 25 sit ups in one minute and minimum vertical jump of 15.5 inches.

While conducting research for entry level physical fitness levels, the Department came to the realization of the potential health benefits as well as the necessity for our current officers to be able to meet these same standards. In order to give an incentive to officers to maintain a healthy level of physical fitness, the Department requested money in the 2008 budget to award officers to maintain a healthy level of physical fitness. The Department will hold two voluntary physical fitness assessments throughout the year, using the same standards as

those used for new recruits. Officers passing both assessments will be rewarded between \$200.00 and \$250.00.

The tests for police officers were held in June and October. Officers passing the test were: Chief Keil, Lt. Foulke, Sgt. Britt, Sgt. Hellenbrand, Sgt. Zimmerman, Detective Faga, Detective Haselow, Officer O'Connor, Officer Jones, Officer Geiszler, Officer Wood, Officer Wipperfurth and Officer Olson.

The Police department has had plans for a new Police Department Building approved by the Middleton City Council and the Plan Commission.


The new building (shown above) will be constructed on land which was previously purchased by the City on Donna Dr. near Parmenter St.

2008 Organizational Chart






2008 Crime & Arrest Data

The following data and charts were derived from police records and may be of interest to internal or external readers. The numbers of index crimes reported to police were up sharply in 2008, returning to 2004 levels, after a three-year decline. This increase is attributed to a rise in simple assaults and property crimes, especially burglary



INDEX CRIMES by YEAR







Citizen Calls for Service by Month
